BACKGROUND

The World Assembly of Youth (WAY), since 1949, has taken an active role in its position as the international coordinating body of 140 member organisations consisting of National Youth Councils and Youth Organisations from around the world.

WAY acknowledges the Universal Human Rights as the foundation of its actions and services for the young people and youth worldwide.

According to the WAY Charter, WAY aims to:

- Increase inter-ethnic respect and to foster inter-cultural and international understanding and cooperation;
- 2. Facilitate the collection of information about the needs and problems of youth;
- 3. Disseminate information about the methods, techniques and activities of youth organizations;
- 4. Promote the interchange of ideas between youth of all countries;
- 5. Assist in the development of youth activities and to promote, by mutual aid, the extension of the work of voluntary youth organizations;
- 6. Cooperate in the development of national youth councils of voluntary youth organizations;
- 7. Establish and maintain relations international organizations, both voluntary and governmental;
- 8. Support and encourage the national movements of non-self-governing countries in their struggle for national liberation;
- 9. Promote tolerance, understanding, solidarity and cooperation among youth men and women irrespective of race, sex, language, religion or political orientation;
- 10. Encourage the full participation of young men and women in the development process of their countries;
- 11. Improve the equality between young men and women
- 12. Act as a representative body of national youth councils to the U.N and other appropriate governmental and non-governmental international bodies.

INTRODUCTION

World Assembly of Youth (WAY), founded in 1949 in London, has retained a universal consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations and worked closely with several agencies of United Nations such as: UNAIDS, UNEP, ILO, UNESCO, UNFPA, UNICEF and WHO. Sixty six years and still counting, WAY has acted as the international coordinating body of 140 member organisations consisting of National Youth Councils and Youth Organisations from all continents of the world.


The objectives of this awareness and educational campaign are listed as follow.

ABOUT GLOBAL MONEY WEEK

Global Money Week is a worldwide celebration intended to empower the next generation of financial actors to be confident, responsible and skilled economic citizens. Every year, entire communities jointly take action to reshape the financial landscape, and give young people the tools and inspiration they need to shape their own future. Global Money Week takes place every year during the second week of March. It is coordinated by the Child and Youth Finance International (CYFI) Secretariat, but the events themselves are organized by schools, universities, government ministries, central banks, and financial institutions, members of the civil society and communities of active youth worldwide. The Secretariat acts as an anchor for Global Money Week activities worldwide, in an effort to coordinate, support and facilitate the many events and initiatives planned by local organizations, institutions and activists. The celebrations of 2015 will take place between 9th to 17th March. During this week various worldwide activities will be held to engage children, youth and their communities to learn about how money works, including saving, gaining employment, and creating livelihoods.

OVERVIEW OF THE ACTIVITY

Acknowledging the partnership established between the World Assembly of Youth (WAY) and the Child and Youth Finance International (CYFI) in 2015, WAY realised the necessity of introducing Global Money Week and raising awareness on the significance of financial education and independence amongst young people particularly those in Melaka and Pahang, Malaysia. Underlying on those aim and purpose, we have conducted the two-days educational and awareness campaign focusing on the importance of financial education and independence amongst young people. The campaign took place in two states of Malaysia. The first campaign took place at Sub Marine Museum in Melaka State on 8th March 2015 from 10.00 a.m. to 01.00 p.m. in partnership with PERZIM, Melaka. ABOUT ONE ASIA 2015: YOUTH'S ROLE IN THE FUTURE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS

Held in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia, the one-day Youth Entrepreneur and Business Leaders Conference aimed at empowering its participants by providing them with a platform to enhance trust and improve cooperation with regional and foreign business partners, share knowledge and experiences and investigate opportunities for sustainable socio-economic development. The Conference brought together entrepreneurs, stakeholders, service providers, experts, academics, government officials and politicians to share ideas and best practices and develop new opportunities for collaboration and sustainable business relations. Asia is the fastest growing economic region and the largest continental economy in the world. This has been achieved through strong market forces, the rise of emerging markets and a new era of free movement of people, goods and services across the region. As a fledging market in the Asian region with strong domestic resources and opportunities for business development and investment, Mongolia is at the forefront of the new era of economic trend for the region and is, therefore, a prime partner to facilitate the Youth Entrepreneur and Business Leaders Conference.

OBJECTIVES

The main objectives of the Conference are listed as below.

- Promote investment and business strategies in the Asian region and showcase existing youth business projects in Asia; Provid a platform for knowledge-sharing, capacity-building, networking for economic and social development;
- Identify aspects of governance that matters most for the economic and business growth as it affects youth;
- Showcase Mongolian market knowledge, innovation initiatives and business opportunities including domestic mega projects;

 Showcase highpotential and inspiring entrepreneurs and provide them opportunities for partnerships and business linkages;

• Provide platform for sharing knowledge of successful corporate governance experiences and identify opportunities for implementation of models to domestic markets and businesses.

OVERVIEW OF THE CONFERENCE

The forum provided the opportunity to hear from key note speakers on various topics and an interactive one-on-one networking session in which participants rotated to meeting various Mongolian and foreign business individuals. Each participant had 30 minutes discussion before rotating to the next individual. A translator was present for each session to facilitate conversation. ABOUT MIYD

The Melaka International Youth Dialogue (MIYD) is an annual programme of the World Assembly of Youth (WAY) which brings together young people and youth leaders from around the world to discuss relevant youth issues. Since 2001, the MIYD has convened on a wide range of issues. The MIYD has witnessed an escalating number of youth participants over the years, willing to participate in the decision making process. With the view of building a stronger partnership between the youth and the society, the MIYD produces a declaration which serves as a guideline for youth to address the selected issues.

INTRODUCTION

"Older men declare war. But it is youth that must fight and die".
- Herbert Hoover, 1944

For the past 14 years, MIYD has been focusing on several youth issues which directly or indirectly affect the daily lives of youth. This year the theme for the MIYD is on 'Youth and Armed Conflict: To Express Without A Fear, To Progress Without A Threat'. Armed conflict is defined as a contested

incompatibility which concerns government and / or territory where the use of armed force between two parties, of which at least one is the government of a state.

Children and youth represent the majority of the population in most countries affected by armed conflicts and are thus disproportionately affected by war. Their suffering bears many faces - they are recruited as child soldiers, are killed and maimed, deprived of education and health care, and separated from their families. Sexual violence is increasingly a characteristic of conflict with detrimental long-term psychological effects on children and youth.

Where wars erupt, suffering and hardship invariably follow. Conflict is the breeding ground for mass violations of human rights including unlawful killings, torture, forced displacement and starvation. The fact that the issue of armed conflict has reached its epic point in recent days is the underlined reason of this year MIYD theme, taking into consideration that young people comprised half of the world population.

THFMF

Henceforth, we have made it a point to focus on 'Youth and Armed Conflict: To Express Without A Fear, To Progress Without A Threat' as our theme for this year MIYD. This theme has been realized to fulfil the principal opinions and roles of young people towards combating armed conflict and promoting sustainable conflict free environment. This 15th MIYD will emphasize in the attainment of the sustainable conflict free generation in which youth will be given opportunity to express and progress themselves free from fear and threat.

An interactive dialogue on this topic will be of significance to form, educate, increase awareness on the challenges and entitlements of youth in the different levels of society that they represent. Therefore, with the above anticipated theme, all participants present, such as: the young people, youth leaders, public and private sector officers, media persona and NGO / CSO representatives will gather to call for action and structure experience on the issue of Youth and Armed Conflict and chart a course towards its solution. The outcome document will also enhance youth contribution towards a better and sustainable future of a conflict free generation.

OBJECTIVES

Throughout the dialogue all participants gathered to call for action based on the following objectives:

- To raise an informative generation on the current situation of youth and armed conflicts with anticipated behaviour adaptation and consequently admission to decision making amongst youth;
- To foster youth action towards implementation of ideas brought forward by the young people for the benefit of the societies;
- To address the determinants and impact of armed conflicts amongst youth;
- To promote equality of opportunities and facilities between young men and women;
- To formulate the environmental, political, economic and cultural factors that are associated with peace building and disarmaments in ensuring young people's right to live in harmony;
- To ascertain the obligations of society to respect, protect and fulfil the right of young people to live, express and improve themselves without fear and threat;
- To classify the role and the contribution of the national youth councils and other stakeholders towards improving and sustaining resourceful policies in combating armed conflict and promoting sustainable conflict free environment;

- To form and advance the national, regional and international policies governing youth and their right to live in peace for the present and future;
- To integrate networking, collaboration and cooperation between public and private sectors, civil societies and other stakeholders to address the issue of youth and armed conflict

ABOUT 26TH INTERNATIONAL YOUTH FORUM

In UN General Assembly 2000, 191 UN participating nations agreed on the action to goals to eradicate extreme poverty and hunger, achieve universal primary education, promote gender equality and empower women, reduce child mortality, improve maternal health, combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases, ensure environmental sustainability, and develop a global partnership for development. 2015 is the year to set new agenda substituting 8 goals which did not accomplish perfectly even though they have demonstrate huge achievements with massive influences in the world

The 26th International Youth Forum with a theme ,' Youth in MDGs and Post 2015' was hosted by the Ministry of Gender Equality and Family, the Republic of Korea (MOGEF); organised by The National Council of Youth Organizations in Korea (NCYOK) in partnership with the World Assembly of Youth (WAY) and the Asian Youth Council (AYC). EDUCATIONAL CAMPAIGN ON INTERNATIONAL OCCURENCE

OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAMME

Month of September is known nationally in Malaysia as a special period to commemorate independence and appreciate the dedication of national heroes. On the last week of August 2015, it was then agreed by all representatives of agencies and organisations attending the meeting of Melaka State EXCO under the portfolio of Heritage and Youth Development to organise an activity in celebrating the 2015 Malaysian Independence month and promoting the youth's aspiration in patriotism. The Youth Patriotism Aspiration of Melaka or known as Aspirasi Patriotisme Belia Melaka (APBM) in Malaysian Language was in the committee's plan. The APBM was planned to be taking place for 2 days which was on 12th September 2015 (evening) and 13th September 2015 (whole day) in Taming Sari Tower, Bandar Hilir, Melaka. In Total, there were at least 30 activities consisted of dances, competitions, exhibitions and other awesome performances as well as fun activities.

As part of the Melaka State EXCO under the portfolio of Heritage and Youth Development, the World Assembly of Youth (WAY) has contributed in this programme by organising educational campaign on international phenomena, including youth issues happening all around the world as well as the Sustainable Development Goals which would be adopted at the end of September 2015. The campaign itself was taking place on 13th September 2015 from 10.00 a.m. to 06.00 p.m. in which our targeted crowd was young people. There were 4 main activities that were organised by the World Assembly of Youth. The brief description of each of those activities is given as follow.

1. Distribution of Flyers Containing All the Youth-Issues

In this campaign, the World Assembly of Youth (WAY) focused on educating young people and bringing awareness about the 21 youth issues. Being an organisation which closely involves with young people, WAY has been specially conducting researches and organising activities which were specially designed to assist in tackling these issues or problems arisen and other relevant matters involving young people from all around the world.

2. My World Survey

My World Survey is a global survey led by the United Nations which asking responders to choose their priorities for a better world. There are 16 issues or areas to choose from; they include better job opportunities; a good education; better healthcare; affordable and nutritious food; support for people who cannot work; freedom from discrimination and persecution; access to clean water and sanitation; reliable energy at home; action taken on climate change; protecting forests, rivers and oceans; an honest and responsive government; better transport and roads; protection against crime and violence; equality between men and women; phone and internet access; as well as political freedoms. In this campaign, WAY also conducted My World Survey in which the Survey Ballots were requested and obtained directly from the My World Committee in the United Nations. The filled survey-ballots would be analysed and finding-report would be produced and sent to the United Nations.

3. Quiz on the SDGs

Besides My World Survey, we also distributed a quiz (10 simple questions) on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) which was aimed to test the knowledge-level of young people in Melaka pertaining to the Global Goals. The result of this quiz will assist us in better understanding the shortage of knowledge that need to be brought up in WAY future awareness or educational campaign.

4. Stamp-Hunting Game

Another fun activity organised by WAY was the stamp-hunting game in which visitor needs to collect all 6 stamps from any exhibitors to complete the form. A visitor who had a completed form with all 6 stamps could claim a mystery-gift (subjected to the availability of the gifts). There were only 60 gifts available (30 gifts were sponsored by Melaka Tourism Promotion Division; the remaining 30 gifts were contributed by the Department of Culture and Heritage, Melaka). A visitor who answered both My World Survey and Quiz on SDGs was given a souvenir and his/her form was stamped.

OBJECTIVES OF THE PROGRAMME

This educational campaign and fun activity was organised to meet the following objectives.

- To measure the knowledge and understanding level of young people in Melaka pertaining to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
- To analysis the young people's preference on their perfect world as Melaka contribution to My World Survey, United Nations
- To educate young people on the 21 youth issues tackled by WAY and encountered by youth worldwide
- To engage young people in fun and educational activity in raising awareness about various international occurrences.

OUTCOMES OF THE PROGRAMME

The survey ballots and answered quiz-papers will be quantitatively and statistically analysed to come out with the report which will have detail findings on the outcome of the study performed. This report will be sent to the United Nations as contribution from young people in Melaka, Malaysia and used as WAY's future reference in selecting and deciding the targeted participants and theme of our upcoming events or programmes.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, this educational campaign on SDGs and other international occurrences which took place in Taming Sari Tower, Bandar hilir, Melaka, was fruitful event. All the stated objectives were achieved and the report containing the findings of both the SDGs quiz and My World Survey was enclosed in this report's appendices-section. The total of 60 mystery gifts were all claimed by visitors who successfully collected 6 stamps from exhibitors present in this event. All young people present during this event was actively involved and have shown their great love towards their country and their appreciation for all outstanding national heroes of Malaysia. In fact, the Youth Patriotism Aspiration of Melaka (APBM) which was firstly organised and officially opened by Hon. Datuk Hjh Norpipah binti Abdol representing Hon. Datuk Seri Ir. Hj. Idris bin Hj. Haron, the Chief Minister of Melaka cum WAY President, has effectively achieved its main objective of alleviating the patriotism aspiration amongst young people in Melaka.

BACKGROUND

Many current models of leadership being employed in the world today threaten the very existence of human kind. Challenges with food security, climate change preparation, transparency in government, gender bias and effective use of new technology requires another kind of leadership model that knows how to effectively integrate principle with knowledge, vision with insight and wisdom with compassion. Prudence and the time sensitive nature of our challenges require us to introduce the next generation of leaders to newer, more creative approaches to leadership that would go above and beyond the current models.

With this in mind, the WAY-DCIS-LEAD International Transformative Leadership Conference was designed to gather young leaders from the World Assembly of Youth and the Denver Center for International Studies in the United States in one place to meet and talk with as well as hear leaders representing new approaches in guiding our communities, our cities, our countries and our world. This conference created not only an opportunity for these young people to make contact with these new methods and expand their capacity, but it also created an opportunity for the WAY/DCIS member to engage in internship work with these organisations and perhaps secured future employment with them. Leaders of these organisations were provided with speaking opportunities and workshops at the conference so that students had a chance to meet them in person and ask questions about how their systems work.

In addition to hearing the new line leaders at the conference, all students who registered for the conference were able to get weekly material from these leaders online through video classes in the LEAD app platform. The WAY DCIS LEAD Transformative Leadership Conference had the potential to create one of the world's largest networks of young leaders committed to building new models of values-based world leadership, steeped in global competency, sustainability, ethics, food security, transparency, environmentalism, enlightenment, personal empowerment, feminine principles, vision and humanitarianism.

INTRODUCTION

Transformative Leadership involves fully assessing the shortcomings of previous leadership models, then learning the skills, locating the resources, gaining the knowledge and adopting the healthy habits of new leadership models that serve the greater good and build on the future. Many of the current leadership practices and models are not only unsustainable, but are not flexible enough to help us manage potential climate change challenges. Leadership models going forward must incorporate ways of empowering more people in the world, utilizing the new technologies to assist them, engaging in feminine-principled decision making, embracing philosophies that include instead of exclude, the implementation of the peer to peer economy, and a rethinking of food and water security. Emerging leaders moving into leadership roles should be equipped with a bigger, broader version of what's possible so that they don't repeat the mistakes of previous generations. This conference provided that opportunity in a community of peers. Various workshops and presentations featured technology gurus, sustainable farming experts, new energy champions, philosophical leaders and a host of other contributors who provided attendees with information and tools.

ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

The first Annual International Transformative Leadership Conference was an international gathering of emerging young global leaders from the World Assembly of Youth and from the Denver Center for International Studies. This gathering was a leadership development event, exposing these young leaders to new paradigm global leadership ideas to use in their future leadership experiences. The new paradigm shift requires new leaders to understand and synthesize sustainability, global competency, feminine principled policy, and vision, connectedness through technology, climate change preparedness, food security and egalitarianism.

GOALS

This conference produced a framework for action to meet the basic needs identified in ten key areas/goals. The goals are listed as follow.

- **Goal 1:** Empower global competency for all conference participants by creating an environment and developing exercises that allow each participant to exchange information, life stories and experiences.
- **Goal 2:** Identify specific leadership methods of global food and water security to champion in our various communities.
- **Goal 3:** Develop a shared new leadership world philosophy that is inclusive, empowering and emphasizes connectedness.

- **Goal 5:** Identify ancient wisdom of primary cultures and understand how that wisdom has an effect on new paradigm leadership models.
- **Goal 6:** Develop a climate change strategy that includes things conference participants can implement in their communities.
- Goal 7: Understand Feminine Principles and the implementation of those principles in leadership.
- Goal 8: Identifying technology trends that can be leveraged for the greater good of humanity.

Goal 9: Share time with leaders of new paradigm organizations.

Goal 10: Make contact with organizations that conference participants can do an internship with.

OBJECTIVES

During the conference all participants were gather to address and call for action on the following objectives:

- To raise awareness of new, innovative and sustainable leadership models.
- To encourage attendee action towards implementation of ideas brought forward in this conference to the benefit of the world.
- To address the challenges that would prevent the attendees from implementing the actions.
- To promote equality of leadership opportunities and facilities between young men and women;
- To evaluate the current environmental, political, economic and cultural factors that are associated with new paradigm leadership.
- To integrate networking, collaboration and cooperation between attendees, between public and private sectors, civil societies and other stakeholders to address the issue of new leadership.

BACKGROUND

In today's complex world where economic, social and political activities are technology-based, environment is often ignored leading to vulnerability towards not only the ecosystem but also the welfare of all living beings and individuals including young people. The eight Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) which addressed and tackled major issues including the issues of extreme poverty, hunger, deadly disease and pandemic, inadequacy of proper shelter, shortage of health facility, gender inequality, lack of access to basic education as well as lack of environmental sustainability, had come to the end, leaving many targeted areas and objectives far from reach.

The UN General Assembly's Open Working Group on Sustainable Development Goals (OWG) has proposed seven-teen goals on July 2014 covering a broad range of sustainable development issues including eradicating poverty and hunger, improving health and education, enabling more sustainable city, combating climate change, and protecting oceans and forests. On 2nd of August 2015, 193 member countries agreed collectively on the 17 of finalised goals and their 169 targets.

- Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages
- Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all
- Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls
- Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all
- Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all
- Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all
- Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation
- Reduce inequality within and among countries
- Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns
- Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts
- Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development
- Protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss
- Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels

IFNGO YOUTH HEALTHY LIFESTYLE WORKSHOP

BACKGROUND

A great investment of any nation is in the upbringing of its youth and this will prepare them to be able to face modern day challenges especially those related to drug abuse. 

It is also a day of reflection among media professionals about issues of press freedom and professional ethics. Just as importantly, World Press Freedom Day is a day of support for media which is a target for the restraint, or abolition, of press freedom. It is also a day of remembrance for those journalists who lost their lives in the exercise of their profession.

This year's theme, "Let Journalism Thrive! Towards Better Reporting, Gender Equality, and Safety in the Digital Age", aims to bring to the attention the situation journalists face when operating in hostile environments. As journalism is more and more carried out over the internet, journalists often are harassed online.

In fact, we also publish a monthly bulletin which comprises up-to-dated news pertaining to young people from at least 25 different countries from all continents of the world. It is our way of showing our appreciation towards the dedication and hard works that press has contributed in spreading the fact from all parts of the world.

APPLY NOW FOR CONSULTATIVE STATUS WITH ECOSOC FOR THE 2016 CYCLE

DATE: 5 JUNE 2015

One of the six principal organs of the United Nations system established by the UN Charter in 1945 is the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). It consists of 54 members of the United Nations, nominated by the General Assembly and coordinates economic, social and related work of the fourteen United Nations specialized agencies, functional commissions and five regional commissions. ECOSOC serves as the central forum for discussing international economic and social issues as well as for formulating policy recommendations addressed to Member States and the United Nations system.

ECOSOC responsibilities are to encourage universal respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms; facilitate international cultural and educational cooperation; identify solutions to international economic, social and health problems; and promote higher standards of living, full employment, economic and social progress.

The open call for Non-Governmental Organisations to apply for Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) Consultative Status with the United Nations, had reached its last month. Therefore, the ECOSOC is calling for the NGOs that are interested in applying for the consultative status to submit their application and required documents before the 1st of June 2015.

The NGOs that are affiliated to an international organisation that is in status would be admitted only if they can demonstrate that their programme of work is direct significance to the aims and purpose of the United Nations. Besides, they must have been in existence and formally registered with the appropriate government authorities as an NGO for at least two years. The interested NGO must also have a recognised headquarters, a democratically adopted constitution, authority to speak for its members, a representative structure, appropriate mechanisms of accountability and democratic and transparent decision making processes.

They are many benefits of obtaining the ECOSOC consultative status which are that NGOs will be able to participate in events, attend meetings, submit written statements prior to sessions, make oral statements, meet official government delegations and other NGO representatives, organise and attend parallel events that take place during the session and to participate in debates, interactive dialogues, panel discussions and informal meetings.

There are five steps on how to apply for the 2016 cycle. Firstly, your organization must have a registered profile before starting the application for consultative status. Secondly, after your profile registration is accepted, your organisation has to submit the application containing the online questionnaire and summary, and the supporting documents. When the application becomes part of the agenda of the NGO Committee, a letter is sent to the NGO informing them of the upcoming session and inviting to send no more than two representatives to be present during the session. The Committee meets twice a year to decide which NGOs applying for consultative status will be recommended to the ECOSOC Council. Lastly, when the Council finally approves the Committee recommendation to grant consultative status to an NGO, an official notification is sent by the Secretariat. NGOs granted General or Special consultative status must submit to the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations, every fourth year, a brief report of their activities, in particular regarding their contribution to the work of the United Nations.

We, at the World Assembly of Youth, encourage all qualified NGOs around the world to apply for the ECOSOC consultative status to be able to partake in the events, meetings and to be recognised. The Consultative Status does not only provide NGOs with access to ECOSOC but also to its many subsidiary bodies, to the various human rights mechanisms of the United Nations, as well as special events organised by the President of the General Assembly.

Since 1974, the celebration campaign of the World Environment Day is hosted in various cities at different parts of the world.

As for this year, the theme selected is "Seven Billion Dreams. One Planet. Consume with Care." It expresses the challenge of creating opportunities for inclusive and sustainable economic development, while attempting to stabilise the rate of resource use and reduce environmental impacts. It is a challenge to all to re-imagine one's dreams or aspirations for a quality life that is de-linked from conspicuous consumption.

We, at World Assembly of youth (WAY) encourage worldwide awareness and action for the environment and a global platform for public outreach that is widely celebrated by stakeholders. On this day, WAY raises a call for everyone to be aware of how the daily individual consumption habits of seven billion people can have a huge impact on the planet, which is why the power to make a change is also in the hand of each one of us. Therefore, for this year, we chose to focus on the sustainable consumption and lifestyles to highlight the urgent necessity of shifting to new patterns of using natural resources.

WORLD DAY TO COMBAT DESERTIFICATION AND DROUGHT: 'ATTAINMENT OF FOOD
SECURITY FOR ALL THROUGH SUSTAINABLE FOOD SYSTEMS'

DATE: 17 JUNE 2015

Hunger is most prevalent in the developing countries, with dry land areas where water retention is poor, and the land is highly vulnerable to natural and human destructions. The vast majority of the dry land people survive on local foods. Sub-Saharan Africa has made some progress in eradicating hunger, but still has the highest prevalence of undernourishment. Tackling hunger requires a multi-faceted approach from economic development, nutritional intake to managing natural disasters.

World Day to Combat Desertification and Drought, 17 June, was proclaimed by the General Assembly in 1994. On that date, the same year, the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification was adopted. It aims to promote community and ecosystem resilience while improving the human condition particularly in dry lands. The decade 2010–2020 has been declared the United Nations Decade for Deserts and the Fight against Desertification (UNDDD).

This year's theme is 'Attainment of food security for all through sustainable food systems', with the slogan, 'No such thing as a free lunch. Invest in healthy soil'. The 2015 observance calls for more investments in sustainable land practices so that sustainable food systems become the normal practice, effective action on desertification whose effects on security, peace and stability are invisible yet real for the affected countries due especially to food and water scarcity and environmentally forced migration and balance in the land use for ecology and consumption, drawing on the best practices.

The World Assembly of Youth (WAY) aims to remind everybody that desertification can be effectively tackled, that solutions are possible, and that key tools to this aim lay in strengthened community participation and co-operation at all levels.

DATE: 26 JUNE 2015

Drug abuse poses significant health challenges. Injecting drug use is a leading cause of the spread of HIV. In some parts of the world, heroin use and HIV have reached epidemic proportions. Drug control - including prevention and measures to reduce the harmful effects of drug use - is therefore an important part of the battle to combat HIV/AIDS.

Today, marks the International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking, designated by the United Nations to strengthen global efforts towards a society free of drug abuse. International Day against Drug Abuse and illicit trafficking is observed annually each year. The day serves as a reminder of the on-going war that is being fought around the world on illicit drug use and trafficking, and that unless there is concerted, sustained effort, Asia may be at risk of fighting a losing battle.

According to the UNODC, nearly 200 million people are using illicit drugs such as cocaine, cannabis, hallucinogens, opiates and sedative hypnotics worldwide. In December 1987 the UN General Assembly decided to observe June 26 as the International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking. The UN was determined to help create an international society free of drug abuse. This resolution recommended further action with regard to the report and conclusions of the 1987 International Conference on Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking.

We, at World Assembly of Youth (WAY) hope to reach as many youth as possible, with the aim to prevent young lives from being lured into taking or trafficking drugs. Our role as an international coordinating body of national youth councils and organisations is to educate, prevent and support, and we urge all members of the public to work with us towards a healthy, drug-free globally.

We believe in the power of young people and their ability to make informed choices about drugs. Some of them simply do not understand the depth to which illicit drugs can destroy their futures. What young people need is on-going engagement, education and awareness of the dangers of drugs, along with understanding, guidance and support from peers, parents, teachers, and other adults, who have a shared responsibility to keep informed of the perils of drugs.

On this International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking, let us reiterate our obligation to this shared responsibility within our communities, and among the family of nations.

By tackling vulnerability, we can significantly reduce the risk of disaster. 

During the welcoming remarks, Ms. Ediola Pashollari introduced the theme of the WAY workshop 'Youth Stand Against Drugs' and welcomed all participants to the workshop. She emphasised on the significance of youth participation in drug prevention programmes and how it builds upon moral values, which are the foundation for unity and cooperation.

ONE ASIA 2015: YOUTH'S ROLE IN THE FUTURE SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS (SDGs)

ULAANBAATAR DECLARATION OF ASIAN YOUTH PRIORITIES

20TH MAY 2015

ULAANBAATAR, MONGOLIA

PREAMBLE

We, the national youth councils, representatives of Government, young people, youth-led organizations, non-governmental organisations and members of the Asian Youth Council, came together in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia on the 19th and 20th May 2015, to explore, discuss and define the priorities and role of Asia's youth in the post-2015 development agenda.

REAFFIRMATION OF EXISTING GLOBAL YOUTH COMMITMENTS

Participants of the 'One Asia' XIII Asian Youth Council General Assembly reaffirm the global community's commitments to youth set forth in the Bali Global Youth Forum Declaration₁, the Colombo Declaration on Youth₂, and the Baku Commitment to Youth Policies₃. The participants of the XIII Asian Youth Council General Assembly have expanded upon these pledges and developed the following commitments and recommendations specific to the issues affecting youth in the Asian region.

GENDER

Commitment 1: Commit to the establishment and strengthening of gender-sensitive national, sub-national and sectoral policies and programs, with specific consideration given to the challenges and issues affecting youth.

Commitment 2: Commit to implementing, improving and funding of nationwide youth friendly prevention, protection and support services for victims of gender-based violence (GBV) through the enactment of GBV laws and regulations, aligned with international standards, and the establishment or improvement of youth friendly legal and support services for victims, such as safe shelters, health, social and psychological services, including prevention and rehabilitation services for perpetrators.

Commitment 3: Commit to implementing and strengthening policies and programmes that increases youth participation in decision-making roles, with particular consideration given to improving access for young women through the establishment of leadership programs, gender sensitive human resource policy implementation and public awareness raising.

- 2. Colombo Declaration on Youth 2014

Recommendations for Action:

- a) Undertake community research on the behaviours, attitudes and perceptions of young people relating to gender-based violence; to support advocacy, awareness raising, community mobilization and educational programmes, as well as legal and policy reforms;
- b) Utilise various educational curricula, including non-formal, such as the UN Women's 'Voices against Violence', for engaging youth and providing them the tools and skills to understand and eradicate the causes of violence in their communities, educate and engage their peers and the community, and learn about support services for victims of violence;
- c) Establish and support leadership and learning networks for young women across areas of education, employment, health, civil, economic and political life, and other effective, evidence-based and results-oriented interventions to promote women's leadership;

HEALTH

Commitment 4: Commit to implementing nation-wide provisions and access to adolescent and youth friendly health services that are sustainable, adequately-funded and staffed, and with standards promoting a holistic, preventative approach to youth health, with specific consideration provided to marginalized, high-risk and vulnerable groups₄.

Commitment 5: Commit to establishing and strengthening multi-sectoral partnerships between governments, health service providers, private sector and youth-serving and youth-led organisations to ensure partners have the capacity to best respond to and prioritize youth health needs, for mental, physical and psychosocial wellbeing.

Commitment 6: Commit to developing and delivering behaviour change communication on youth-specific health issues and behavioural risks, including but not limited to, engagement through formal and informal educational institutions, health promotion campaigns, health volunteer networks and social media, at the national and sub-national level.

Call to action: As young women and men, we call on our fellow youth to take responsibility to practice healthy lifestyles, choices and behaviours; to act as change agents and leaders for youth health.

^{4.} Marginalized, high-risk and vulnerable groups including, but not limited to LGBTQI, refugees, rural populations, unemployed, out-of-school, sex workers, indigenous, migrants, young people in conflict and emergency situations, young women and adolescent girls, persons with disabilities, substance users, young people living with HIV and AIDS, Tuberculosis and Hepatitis virus, and young people who have been victims of violence, including gender-based violence.

Recommendations for Action:

- a) Undertake research on youth health related issues, including sexual and reproductive health, so as to advocate and promote accurate information and evidence-based solutions and approaches on youth health issues;
- b) Provide youth-specific education to health service providers so as to increase their capacity to effectively meet youth-friendly health service standards and respond effectively to youth physical and psychosocial health needs;
- c) Create youth-friendly, engaging online platforms and information services on youth health information, education and services.

EDUCATION

Commitment 7: Commit to developing and providing equal and equitable access to education at all levels for youth, with specific consideration given to vulnerable and marginalised groups, through the development of stable, long-term policies and programmes which deliver quality, inclusive and supportive learning environment and opportunities, free from discrimination, abuse and violence.

Commitment 8: Commit to incorporating ethics and life skills education into standard education curriculums and establishing monitoring systems and protection mechanisms that ensure participation, transparency, accountability, and fairness within educational institutes.

Commitment 9: Commit to developing, strengthening and regulating public-private partnerships with educational institutes to institutionalise local and international work experience opportunities, internships and career counselling for youth, thereby ensuring youth are better equipped to meet labour market demands and gain practical, relevant industry skills.

Recommendations for Action:

- a) Promote educational regulation and standardisation to ensure quality education for youth by enforcing internationally recognised curricula standards;
- Develop, promote and expand existing international study exchange and scholarship programs, in addition to information and skills sharing networks through youth-friendly communication channels;
- c) Provide skills training to governments and private sector partners on mechanisms and approaches to support youth in formal and non-formal education and employment, including youth-friendly workplace and supportive supervision practices;
- d) Support the decentralization of education opportunities to improve rural youth's access to education opportunities, through provision of incentives for teachers to undertake rural employment and providing priority funding to rural educational institutes, amongst other effective, evidence-based interventions.

EMPLOYMENT

Commitment 10: Commit to developing and strengthening long-term, stable cooperation between governments, educational institutes, youth-serving and youth-led organisations and private sector so as to provide youth with responsive, appropriate and accessible information on specific labour market demands, ensure youth obtain relevant industry

skills, are better connected with the global business network and are internationally competitive.

Commitment 11: Commit to developing and implementing support mechanisms that promote youth employment, including self-employment, entrepreneurship and small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) for young people, through the establishment of information and services, practical training and learning opportunities, access to credit and linkages with the broader private sector, both nationally and across Asia.

Commitment 12: Commit to developing, implementing and enforcing laws, policies and programmes that support and promote stable, safe, secure and non-discriminatory employment, and youth-friendly working environment for youth, which are aligned with international labour conventions with respect to employment standards and workers' rights of youth.

Recommendations for Action:

- a) Improve youth access to information and opportunities for career guidance, skills development, employment, and entrepreneurship by developing participatory online information platforms, referral and employment promotion services and peer-to-peer mentoring programmes;
- b) Implement and support national and industry-specific, regulated, youth-friendly work experience and volunteering opportunities for youth, with clear implementation standards and protection for participants;
- c) Promote and advocate for the simplification of business and employment regulatory environments so as to foster youth entrepreneurship, and the training and hiring of youth.

YOUTH POLICIES AND PROGRAMMES

Commitment 13: Commit to developing and institutionalising national, holistic, inclusive and progressive youth policies and programmes that uphold the human rights of young people, create an enabling, youth-friendly environment, foster economic opportunities and empower youth, with specific consideration provided to marginalised and vulnerable groups, with dedicated and adequate funding from national and sub-national budgets.

Commitment 14: Commit to the recognition, appreciation and meaningful participation of youth by decision- makers in the development, implementation, and monitoring and evaluation of youth policies and programmes, in order to ensure their full implementation and impact, free from political influence.

Commitment 15: Commit to adopting an integrated, coordinated and participatory approach and creating a sustainable inter-sectoral mechanism for youth development with clear linkages to economic, social, cultural and other policies that promote complete well-being for youth through targeted interventions addressing youth issues from a human rights perspective.

Recommendations for Action:

a) Ensure allocation of government budget to competent and qualified youth-led, youth-serving non-profit organisations, to broaden youth leadership, youth protection,

- consultation, youth policy development and implementation, research, campaigns and broader youth development;
- Organize formal, effective, inter-sectoral, inclusive task forces to develop, design, implement, monitor and evaluate youth policy frameworks, that provide for youth-responsive budgeting, with clear strategies for implementation, and which identify explicit benchmarks and targets for measuring progress on the implementation of the policies;
- c) Develop and implement formal mechanisms for fostering intergovernmental, civil society service coordination, through the establishment of committees and by providing priority funding and support to competent and qualified organisations who participate in interagency coordination on youth issues.

YOUTH PARTICIPATION AND ACTIVE CITIZENSHIP

Commitment 16: Commit to developing and implementing responsive, proactive and progressive youth policies through the creation of strong national policy frameworks, establishing dedicated youth agencies and fostering a supportive environment for youth involvement and engagement.

Commitment 17: Commit to promoting and supporting public awareness and advocacy of sustainable development, by utilising youth-friendly engagement activities and accessible communication mediums such as social networks, grass root community engagement and youth friendly education.

Commitment 18: Commit to support youth political participation and civic engagement, at local, national and regional levels, by providing minimum youth representative requirements, establishing youth-supportive environments for participation and engaging with youth-led organisations, so to enable them to play their full part in building stronger, more inclusive and sustainable communities.

Recommendations for Action:

- a) Create and support national funding pools for youth-led and youth-oriented civic engagement initiatives, accessed through transparent and competitive selection;
- b) Create and support accessible formal mechanisms for meaningful participation of young people in matters affecting their interests, both nationally, regionally and locally, focusing on enabling youth to make informed decisions, holding governments accountable, and to be agents of change, by utilising youth-friendly communication mediums, such as social media, peer-to-peer mentoring, and formal and non-formal educational activities;
- c) Establish well-supported and managed nation-wide youth volunteering and leadership programs to promote active citizenship and improve social cohesion.





MELAKA INTERNATIONAL YOUTH DIALOGUE DECLARATION

"YOUTH AND ARMED CONFLICT: TO EXPRESS WITHOUT A FEAR, TO PROGRESS WITHOUT A THREAT"

22ND to 24TH JUNE 2015

KINGS GREEN HOTEL, MELAKA, MALAYSIA

1 PREAMBLE

- 1.1 We, the 210 young people from 43 countries around the world, attending the 15th Melaka International Youth Dialogue (MIYD), convened in Melaka from 22nd 24th June, 2015 for an annual program organized by the World Assembly of Youth (WAY):
- 1.2 **Noting** that children and youth represent the majority of the population in most countries affected by armed conflicts and are thus disproportionately affected by war. More than 1.5 billion people, 40 percent of them being youth, live in countries where levels of criminal violence are on the increase.
- 1.3 **Acknowledging** that suffering of young people bears many faces they are recruited as child soldiers, are killed and maimed, deprived of education and health care, and separated from their families.
- 1.4 **Recognizing** that conflict is the breeding ground for mass violations of human rights including unlawful killings, torture, forced displacement and starvation.
- 1.5 **Understanding** the world is home to the largest generation of young people in history.
- 1.6 For the past 14 years, MIYD has been focusing on several youth issues which directly or indirectly affect the daily lives of youth. In 2015, the theme for the 15th MIYD was 'Youth and Armed Conflict: To Express Without A Fear, To Progress Without A Threat'.

The guiding principles for this declaration were based on the following objectives:

 To raise an informative generation on the current situation of youth and armed conflicts with anticipated behaviour adaptation and consequently admission to decision making amongst youth;

- To foster youth action towards implementation of ideas brought forward by the young people for the benefit of the societies;
- To address the determinants and impact of armed conflicts amongst youth;
- To promote equality of opportunities and facilities between young men and women;
- To formulate the environmental, political, economic and cultural factors that are associated with peace building and disarmaments in ensuring young people's right to live in harmony;
- To ascertain the obligations of society to respect, protect and fulfil the right of young people to live, express and improve themselves without fear and threat.
- To classify the role and the contribution of the national youth councils and other stakeholders towards improving and sustaining resourceful policies in combating armed conflict and promoting sustainable conflict free environment;
- To form and advance the national, regional and international policies governing youth and their right to live in peace for the present and future;
- To integrate networking, collaboration and cooperation between public and private sectors, civil societies and other stakeholders to address the issue of youth and armed conflict;

2 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 Participants identified key recommendations for adoption by the public sector, private sector, NGOs, media and youth. In addition, participants established commitments and outcomes in the pursuit of peace among nations and a conflict free generation.
- 2.2 Based on the dialogue, and building on the progress in the implementation of The World Programme of Action for Youth, we call upon the following stakeholders to:

2.1 PUBLIC SECTOR

- 2.1.1 Train public officers with the right knowledge and skills in order to execute and sustain policies that would prevent armed conflict and meet the needs of community.
- 2.1.2 *Develop* policies that would address and prevent armed conflict within the country and region.
- 2.1.3 *Establish* a platform that would ensure and serve the bureaucratic interest of the community in a transparent manner.
- 2.1.4 *Maintain* neutrality in conflict resolution for the betterment of society.
- 2.1.5 *Inculcate* in school curriculum the basic values of life on inter-faith, inter-generation, and inter-ethnicity, to avoid conflict.
- 2.1.6 *Invite* all stakeholders to promote entrepreneurship among young people as a tool to prevent youth restiveness and extremism.
- 2.1.7 *Ensure* equity in distribution of information and resources throughout the community.
- 2.1.8 *Create* a new paradigm for just, sustainable and rights based development.

- 2.1.9 *Create* policies that would address fundamental inequalities between young people and inequalities between countries, while promoting rights based approach and putting young people at its centre.
- 2.1.10 *Emphasize* commitment to the wellbeing of young people and the planet.
- 2.1.11 *Include* youth in decision making processes, policy implementation, monitoring and evaluation, in youth related issues.
- 2.1.12 Ensure young people's involvement in creating, developing and sustaining of resources that would lead to the betterment of standards of living, in order to avoid any form of conflict.
- 2.1.13 *Ensure* adequate youth activities in development and creation of enabling environments for jobs to promote peace and unity.
- 2.1.14 *Create* robust, transparent, multi-sectorial accountability mechanism at the national level that includes meaningful participation of youth and civil society organizations.

2.2 PRIVATE SECTOR

- 2.2.1 *Invest* and sponsor social activities that would promote peace, unity and progress, at national, regional and global level.
- 2.2.2 *Ensure* that youth are introduced and engaged to the employment opportunities and capacity building activities for the betterment of community.
- 2.2.3 *Partner* up in peace building efforts and positively influence negotiations whenever conflicts arise.
- 2.2.4 *Encourage* partnership with all stakeholders towards youth empowerment and development programmes, including CSR initiatives.
- 2.2.5 *Create* connection between economic and social development for the betterment of youth.

2.3 NON-GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATIONS

- 2.3.1 *Sustain* advocacy for transparency and guarantee freedom of speech by government and relevant stakeholders.
- 2.3.2 *Create* platforms to evolve monitoring mechanisms of activities carried out by all stakeholders, in order to avoid conflict.
- 2.3.3 *Initiate* and develop programmes and activities for youth in areas engulfed in armed conflict.
- 2.3.4 *Create* rehabilitative youth activities in post-conflict regions towards sustainable development.
- 2.3.5 *Develop* programmes that would promote commitment to the achievement of human rights and inclusiveness of young people in the process.
- 2.3.6 *Insist* on transparent democratic processes in order to avoid conflict in society.
- 2.3.7 Encourage partnership among all stakeholders and promote peace and sustainability
- 2.3.8 *Appoint* youth ambassadors that would propagate peace in conflict and post-conflict areas.
- 2.3.9 Enhance communication and cooperation amongst themselves in order to reinforce their effectiveness as participants in the implementation of sustainable development.

2.4 MEDIA

- 2.4.1 *Positive* use of social media; such as promotion of campaigns, creating awareness and information dissemination.
- 2.4.2 Sharing important and relevant news in public and private social media accounts, in order to inform the broader public of development concerning issues of Governance, Social-Economic, Security, etc.
- 2.4.3 Address the issues of Governance by policy analysis, and ensure that it is accessible to all.
- 2.4.4 *Insist* on objective reporting on youth related issues.
- 2.4.5 *Use* Non-Mainstream media and social media to disseminate rightful information to the society.
- 2.4.6 *Use* media to get across information at all levels, especially the rural areas.
- 2.4.7 *Gather* information and ideas from society with regards to youth issues.
- 2.4.8 *Establish* media platforms that would create and share high-quality education and information, accessible to all.
- 2.4.9 *Promote* transparency and accountability in the government by reminding them to fulfil electoral promises.
- 2.4.10 *Influence* all stakeholders to develop and implement crucial policies that are inclusive for the marginalized, indigenous, disadvantaged and disabled groups.
- 2.4.11 *Set* realistic measures of proper information management to avoid cyber crime among youth.

2.5 YOUTH

- 2.5.1 *Encourage* friendly approaches to overcome misunderstandings of social-economic issues.
- 2.5.2 Engage in meaningful activities and promote sustainable development for all.
- 2.5.3 Discover and nurture talents and potential in order to desist from social violence.
- 2.5.4 *Establish* platforms that would strengthen the role of youth in the decision making process at all levels.
- 2.5.5 *Represent* the positive values and interest of the community in order to avoid violence in their daily life.
- 2.5.6 *Initiate* and engage in peaceful dialogue in the midst of conflict.
- 2.5.7 *Partake* in grassroots development initiatives and promote peace in partnership with all stakeholders.

3 CONCLUSION

We, the participants of the 15th Melaka International Youth Dialogue, acknowledge the importance of a society where the youth should be given the opportunity to express and progress themselves free from fear and threat. Where wars erupt, suffering and hardship invariably follow. We seek to generate youth dialogues and advocate for legislations, policies and programmes at all levels of society in order to achieve peace among all nations, a conflict free generation and inclusion in the consultations of the Sustainable Development Goals and Post-2015 Development Agenda.

YOUTH DECLARATION 18TH TO 24TH AUGUST 2015 SEOUL AND GOESAN, REPUBLIC OF KOREA

Preamble

71 youth delegates representing 25 countries gathered in Seoul and Goesan, Republic of Korea, to discuss the role of the youth in contributing to the realization of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and the Post 2015 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Despite the remarkable progress and unprecedented levels of global attention and effort seen in the last years, the United Nations (UN), along with the Member States and wider international community, were not able to reach the MDGs goals and targets since their introduction in 2000. As a consequence, the UN announced to set a new agenda at the end of 2015 substituting the MDGs with a post 2015 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) framework.

Although the MDGs were unquestionably well-intentioned, the needs and skills of the youth as well as their empowerment were omitted in the framework, and thus the MDGs failed to recognize the youth as strategic actors in the solution matrix. As the international community prepares itself for the launch of the Post 2015 goals, it is important that youth are included as equal partners in the implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of the framework.

Declaration

Recalling the commitment of the United Nations and its Member States to recognize the youth as an integral part in the development of the Post 2015 Agenda, youth in all their diversity should be considered a strategic capacity building player, allowed to assume responsibilities in the political, economic, and social domains in their countries and communities.

To affirm their commitment to bettering the society and to make an active contribution to the Post 2015 Sustainable Development Goals building efforts, the participants of this forum present the following recommendations:

MDG 1 Declaration: Eradicate Extreme Poverty and Hunger

Despite a considerable decrease in the number of people living below the poverty line and the proportion of undernourished people in the world, eradicating extreme poverty and hunger remains a considerable challenge in many developing countries. The youth have the capacity to play a significant role in eradicating poverty and hunger, contributing profoundly with their innovative and fresh perspectives and actions. As such,

We, the youth, commit ourselves to:

- 1. Increase activity and involvement in local initiatives related to combating poverty and hunger by:
 - a. Organizing programs such as workshops and/or seminars at universities to raise awareness and call for action
 - b. Using printed documents and mass media to reach wider audience
 - c. Supporting and volunteering with non-governmental organizations active in the field of food distribution and donation
- 2. Advocate for the establishment of youth-focused forums on global issues and sources of poverty and hunger to be able to actively collaborate with each other, learn about good practices, and find effective solutions within the international community
- 3. Actively support other initiatives concerning poverty and hunger alleviation, including but not limited to, education, employment, and public health, as poverty remains a structural issue rather than an isolated one:
 - a. Establish after-school seminars at secondary and tertiary level educating wider community about the interconnectedness of such issues
 - b. Call for more engagement in community service programs and other volunteering activities in such areas

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Emphasize the creation and strengthening of social safety net policies for the most marginalized through:
 - a. Cash transfers for the poorest and least skilled, conditional upon participation in retraining workshops and any other skills-enhancing programs
- 2. Continually strive to invest in measures boosting economic competitiveness and improve employment opportunities to all via:
 - a. Investing in education by creating schools and after-school programs and increasing of the number of quality teaching staff
 - b. Activation of the labor force through vocational programs, especially for the low-skilled women and youth
 - c. Supporting measures improving access and quality of health care, as healthy labor force is a necessary precondition for economic productivity
- 3. Actively work towards eliminating labor exploitation in all countries, with a special emphasis on children and women by:
 - a. Creating and strengthening legislation on labor conditions and labor exploitation
 - b. Imposing stricter sanctions for not complying with such laws
 - c. Strengthen controlling mechanisms surveying labor conditions in large factories to ensure adequate working conditions
- 4. Continue to support civil society measures and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) that actively promote poverty and hunger alleviating initiatives by:
 - a. Holding fundraising activities, e.g. concerts, sports events, and other related events

- b. Drawing civilians' attention to NGOs activities through increased and non-biased media coverage
- c. Creating special government-supported funds dedicated to combating poverty and hunger
- 5. Invest in rebuilding programs in poverty- and violence-stricken areas to help affected communities heal and recover

MDG 2 Declaration: To Achieve Universal Primary Education

Universal access to education is necessary to ensure the right to self-realization and socialeconomic mobility for all. However, as access to education and quality of education systems vary across countries, there is a pressing need to find solutions to such issues. As such,

We, the youth commit ourselves to:

- 1. Actively engage in awareness raising measures regarding the importance of primary education, especially for girls, the poor, and children living in rural areas by:
 - a. Promoting and engaging in clubs or other related activities aiming to improve access to education for the communities in need
 - b. Organizing events and door-to-door initiatives in rural and remote regions
 - c. Create online databases with free access to primary level learning material to children and their families
 - d. Creating and spreading promotional videos and other measures underscoring the importance of education
- 2. Contribute to the creation and strengthening of educational facilities and materials for every child by:
 - a. Supporting the establishment of nation-wide "academic resource banks" collecting books and other learning material from graduates and distribute them to students unable to afford such items
 - b. Forming an alumni network that strives to improve facilities of their respective schools via giving donations, organizing crowd-funding activities, or volunteering
 - c. Ensuring that funds or donation received are directed through the right channels and actually reach the individuals in need by strictly monitoring the management of finances

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Increase accessibility to schools, regardless of region or remoteness of the settlement via:
 - a. Ensuring that more schools are constructed in rural settlements
 - b. Providing transportation to and from school for cases whereby the above cannot apply
 - c. Providing free meals at school for the poorest students to avoid potential drop outs to child labor
 - d. Fund schemes that support low-income families to pay for school expenses
 - e. Create an online database with school materials and videos accessible to all children
- 2. Improve the general quality of primary education for all by:
 - a. Ensuring that teachers are regularly retrained and adequately compensated.

- b. Providing monetary and non-monetary incentives to motivate teachers to work in remote and underdeveloped areas.
- c. Distributing materials and organize events that facilitate learning and growth for children even outside of schools that invigorate public interest in education and minimize the risk of dropouts at primary school level, for example via:
 - i. Inter-regional quiz competitions
- d. Supporting volunteer teachers
- e. Promoting interdisciplinary learning among students and engaging students in extracurricular activities
- 3. Increase engagement centered on the eradication of child labor to increase the proportion of children to attend school instead via:
 - a. Providing families with a steady flow of income conditional upon the children's attendance at school
 - b. Strengthening the sanction and penalty system for violating laws banning child labor
 - c. Creating awareness via media and campaign denouncing child labor
- 4. Call on tertiary educational institutions to implement compulsory credit schemes for students to engage in community service, such as teaching assistance in underdeveloped regions

MDG 3 Declaration: Promote Gender Equality and Empower Women

This council understands Gender Equality as equality of rights, motivation, safety, and freedom of choice for both genders regardless of their age, race, ethnicity, nationality, sexual preference, and health state, under all of the political, economic, cultural, social, and health domains.

In order to empower women and remove gender-based stereotypes, while ensuring the inclusiveness of both genders, youth and society constitute the matrix of the solution. As such,

We, the youth commit ourselves to:

- Actively participate in actions raising awareness and promoting gender equality across their various domains, to both create, and later sustain a fair and just culture within our society. By actions we suggest:
 - Establishing initiatives and youth clubs that empower women and target gender related issues, while collaborating with governmental bodies and private sector to amplify positive impact
 - b. Organizing public educational campaigns within schools and universities
 - c. Promoting employment opportunities for women, including self-employment
 - d. Share young role models' success stories
- 2. Support survivors of gender-based discrimination, inequality, or violence. This can involve:
 - a. Collect donations to fund counseling programs for the survivors in rehabilitation centers
 - b. Organize seminars and cultural events to address the negative impact gender inequality may cause

3. Endorse the engagement of men, boys and families as agents of change in promoting gender equality and preventing and condemning violence against women and girls.

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Restructure and enforce laws and policies to promote the eradication of gender based violence and inequality, by which we mean:
 - a. Reviewing crime laws and extend punishments for sexual or gender-based crimes
 - b. Extending labor laws to ensure just rights and fair wages for all women and men
 - c. Reviewing the access to education systems with particular focus on equal involvement of males and females in formal and informal education.

MDG 4 Declaration: Reduce Child Mortality

Reducing the mortality rate among children is necessary in order to ensure sustainable growth in each country and building a successful society. Despite global efforts, around 6 million children under the age of five do not survive, and a full one third of those deaths occur due to severe malnutrition. As such,

We, the youth, commit to:

- 1. Raising awareness on the importance of breastfeeding and intensive care for infants, especially in high risk areas through:
 - a. Promoting the establishment of health camps supported by the government and NGOs
 - b. Creating video and other interactive campaigns demonstrating correct healthcare practices to communities suffering from high rates of child mortality

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Focus more on building high-tech, evidence-based, cost-effective measures, such as vaccinations and antibiotics, especially in remote areas
- 2. Encourage safe practices among pregnant women by teaching them about the importance of regular visits of the healthcare establishments to ensure smooth pregnancy
- 3. Promoting and investing in proper hygienic, sanitation, and cost-effective water supply initiatives, particularly in remote areas to ensure access to clean water to all, especially young children and their mothers
- 4. Ensuring allocation of high-quality food, vitamin and other nutritional supplements in remote areas in order to prevent malnutrition among infants and young children

MDG 5 Declaration: Improve Maternal Health

Maternal health refers to the health of women during pregnancy, childbirth, and the postpartum period. Protecting the health of all mothers is a prerequisite for the delivery of healthy babies and plays a vital role in the stability of a family. As such,

We, the youth, commit ourselves to:

1. Volunteer at community service organizations that serve pregnant women

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Recognize maternal and child care as a national priority by:
 - a. Creating and implementing a national plans for scaling maternal health services through building and modernizing existing infrastructure, including:
 - i. Human resources, transport and communication systems
 - a. Ensuring that health insurance coverage includes a robust coverage of care for pregnant women and their newborns
 - b. Ensuring accessibility of maternal services for all women, particularly women from communities who have been historically disadvantaged in accessing said services
 - c. Setting a legal framework for assigning outreach doctors to distant areas
 - d. Building partnership initiatives with civil society institutions, health providers, and the media to optimize resources management and coordinated child care and minimize bureaucratic redundancies
 - e. Providing early education to young women to avoid unwanted pregnancies
 - f. Increasing the availability and quality of training courses for midwives to ensure that high quality child-birth care is standardized and widely available
- 2. Support research and development programs to gain new insight and innovative solutions to maternal health-related problem

MDG 6 Declaration: Combat HIV/AIDS, Malaria, and Other Diseases

The international community has made a considerable progress towards achieving the goals set under the Millennium Development Goal 6. The incidence rate of HIV, malaria and tuberculosis infections have decreased worldwide since 2000. Nevertheless, challenges still persist in the Sub-Saharan African region that reports 99% of all deaths caused by preventable diseases. As such,

We, the youth, commit ourselves to:

- 1. Continue to raise awareness about HIV/AIDS, malaria, tuberculosis and other infectious diseases both physically at public spaces and educational institutions and virtually on online platforms, especially in areas where as knowledge about HIV, HIV prevention, and other diseases remain low through:
 - a. Creating teams of young peer educators to spread knowledge in local communities
 - b. Creating user-friendly picture manuals to materials such as malaria safety nets to ensure proper usage
 - c. Door-to-door local initiatives
 - d. Digital channels of communication
- 2. Actively contribute to decrease the instances of disease infection by promoting responsible behavior by educating youth on sexual and reproductive health and rights through a peer education program

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

1. Promote scientific and technological research in order for the youth to be able to develop innovative tools to collect data, find relative treatments, preventive measures,

and educate society about the existence of HIV/AIDS, malaria, tuberculosis and other diseases by:

- a. Actively encouraging social entrepreneurship and creation of basic entrepreneurship courses
- b. Creating and supporting health-focused internship programs at local clinics
- 2. Strengthen health care systems by:
 - a. Making healthcare accessible and affordable
 - b. Improving the quality of provided services
 - c. Increasing the qualifications of medical personnel
 - d. Developing and evaluating health technologies and practices
 - e. Supporting initiatives focused on improvement of public health
- 3. Improve global partnership for collecting data on patient monitoring and the spread of infectious diseases to curb the growing appearance of drug-resistant diseases by:
 - a. Sharing technology know-how and providing medical assistance to countries with weaker health care systems
 - b. Matching developing countries and developed countries one by one to cooperate with each other
- 4. Actively encourage an inclusive intergenerational dialogue and partnership between the local, national, and international community among the youth and adults (such as community leaders and elders) via:
 - a. Public speakers series at popular public places and educational institutions
 - b. Strategic use of mass media and social media networks

MDG 7 Declaration: Ensure Environmental Sustainability

Environmental sustainability aims to protect the needs of the present generation without affecting the fate of the future one, where the solutions should simultaneously address environmental and economic problems. Environmental sustainability measures have to be integrated into country policies and programs in order to reverse the loss of resources, reduce biodiversity loss, and guarantee a viable planet for the generations to come. As such,

We, the youth, commit ourselves to:

- 1. Engage in voluntary activities such as:
 - a. Participating in local and global environmental events
 - b. Engaging in youth-led environmental organizations
 - c. Organizing campaigns that promote environment-friendly behavior
 - d. Exploring and developing creative ideas that may lead to eco-friendly inventions

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Play an active role in decision making in the field of environment by serving as a supervisory role of government policies.
- 2. Recognize the importance of environmental sustainability because it is crucial to be informed about the current issues in order to find effective solutions. It is viable to reach the objective by:
 - a. Organizing local educational seminars and/or forums

- b. Inviting environmental scientists and/or experts to share ideas with the wider community
- c. Supporting environmental research institutions
- d. Internalizing environmental sustainability in educational systems
- e. Opening science centers that provide direct interaction with the environment for children.
- f. Promoting environmental campaigns about local pollution and other environmental issues
- 3. Promote active participation in environmental activities, such as:
 - a. Green idea competitions
 - b. Weekly trash-picking
 - c. Tree planting Challenges (i.e. ice-bucket challenge)
 - d. Green cooperatives for increasing the expansion of renewable energies; (PIMBY: Please in my backyard)
 - e. Use rechargeable batteries and solar panel installations
 - f. 3Rs (Reuse, Reduce, Recycle)

MDG 8 Declaration: Global Partnership for Development

Official development assistance (ODA) has slowed down in recent years, after increasing significantly in the first decade of the new millennium. Thus, greater funding and innovation are crucial to the implementation of the post-2015 development agenda. As such,

We, the youth commit ourselves to:

- 1. Playing an active role in global partnerships for development through:
 - a. Being aware of current development issues by participating in NGOs and non-commercial organizations
 - b. Taking part in sharing information of development goals and partnership through:
 - i. Social media and other digital communication sources
 - ii. Participating in exchange programs
 - Encouraging the international community to adopt the United Nations Official development assistance (ODA) targets of 0.7 per cent in order to ensure sustainable development
- 2. Working together to build better global partnerships for development through one of the following:
 - a. Encouraging partnerships both locally and globally through the internet and all other channels of communication
 - b. Participating in seminars, training, and youth conferences

We, the youth, call on our governments and societies to:

- 1. Improve cross-sectoral communication between non-governmental organizations to better coordinate activities and avoid overlap by:
 - a. Building a committee monitoring the cooperation between organizations
 - b. Working together with the governments of respective countries and society in general by exposing actual problems to government organizations

- 2. Allow active participation of the civil society in government budget planning and monitoring of budget expenditure to ensure sound governance and fiscal management:
 - a. Enabling civil society organizations to expose potential cases of corruption and misuse of public funds, and/or openly receive complaints or reports on projects
 - b. Permitting civil society leaders to participate in budget planning sessions
 - c. Improving the channels of communication between the government and civil society organization members during the drafting of the budget for development projects
 - d. Making periodic governmental reports on the projects
 - e. Improving access to information on such projects
- 3. Cooperation between corporations that share production lines is an efficient way to reduce expenses and cultivate small businesses. Governments and organizations should establish and/or organize networks between companies in the same industrial field by:
 - a. Promoting co-development of new technologies to streamline the process
 - b. Organizing joint meetings and exchange of information
 - c. Making industrial clusters (like business districts) including research venues

MY World Global Survey Report

MY World is a United Nations global survey for citizens. Working with partners, The United Nations aim to capture people's voices, priorities and views, so that world leaders can be informed as they begin the process of defining the next set of global goals. Over 8.5 million people have shared their perspectives on the new agenda on MY World. This would not be possible without the hundreds of partners who enabled the UN to listen to millions of people's voices, including those of many who don't often get any say in global debates. A bold new global agenda to end poverty by 2030 and pursue a sustainable future was unanimously adopted on September 25th 2015 by the 193 Member States of the United Nations.

Through creative online and offline methods, MY World asks individuals which six of sixteen possible issues they think would make the most difference to their lives. 



Sisk, founder of LEAD Leadership Development and the Leadership Development Specialist for the World Assembly of Youth, along with Dr. Dan Lutz, the founder of The Denver Center for International Studies in Denver, Colorado, held a series of discussions between them on ways of helping young people become leaders more in keeping with the technological, philosophical and economic changes in the world. From those discussions, Sisk and Lutz created a non-profit organization called CO-LEAD in 2014. This organization was dedicated to three central themes: 1. Sharing information to emerging leaders about the global paradigm shift and how this shift will affect how the world operates. 2. Develop new leadership models among young people that reflected the dramatic changes in the world so that the leadership models are based on 21st century knowns instead of 20th century concepts and ideas. 3. Further increase global competency among young adults in our sphere of influence. From the development of CO-LEAD, came the proposal of a conference that would feature a collaborative virtual internship leading up to the gathering. The conference would be in partnership with the World Assembly of Youth and would invite WAY members along with Denver Center for International Studies to attend. The conference was held October 7th& 8th on the University of Colorado Auraria campus in Denver, Colorado.

1.1 Opening and Closing of the Project.

The conference project formally opened in the summer of 2014 which allowed Chet W. Sisk to share the intent of the project with WAY members at the WAY conference in Tirana, Albania in December of 2014. The project was formally closed October 10th after all attendees returned home and the conference was concluded. The basic

outputs of the conference were delivered, the closing date was reached and the budget was expended.

Highlights and Innovations

Some of the highlights and innovations of the conference include the following:

We created online virtual internships that paired Denver Centre for International Studies members with World Assembly of Youth members. These internship teams would tackle specific issues in the world and create a team solution that can be practically applied in the world.

We introduced the members of WAY and DCIS to ideas surrounding a dramatic shift in how the world operates. We have labelled this the current world paradigm shift. The current world paradigm shift includes:

- The emergence of the Sharing Economy, where we share more than we own, which reduces consumer debt and makes more things within reach of more people.
- The emergence of Bitcoin and other open source monetary units, which will allow more individuals to do trade and commerce around the world.
- The emergence of Ubuntu or connectedness as a world philosophy. This
 philosophy is in keeping with the emerging technology which indicates
 collaboration is a more effective and efficient way to manage things in the
 world.
- The rise of Social Entrepreneurship that emphasizes new companies must combine doing good (social responsibility) with doing well (profits).

We introduced a new avenue for the US to be more regularly engaged with the WAY membership. We feel this is critical at a time when world tensions can lead to less contact. We believe this is a time for more.

Project Performance

Our planned performance of the conference did not match the actual outcome. There were several challenges that affected the performance.

a. The issuance of VISAs for participants who were coming from other countries. This primarily had to do with CO-LEAD's unfamiliarity with the process and our lack of communication with WAY in order to help us manage this.

- b. Funding from local sources. Our local funding efforts for the conference were short of what we needed to pull off the conference more effectively.
- c. Our staff organization was an area that could have been developed more effectively in order to manage the many variables that putting on a conference of this magnitude required including our communication with WAY.
- d. Members of one of the participating DCIS schools experienced challenges in getting to the conference and thus, were not able to present.

There were several pluses that helped the conference actualize some exceptional success,

- a. We invited members of World Denver as well as The University of Colorado to attend the conference. The energy they brought to the event helped empower our students who were presenting.
- b. The presentations by many of the DCIS students on the issues they were well received by the attending audience. The question and answer session was particularly strong and informative.
- c. Several of the participating DCIS students mentioned how much the information we introduced to them concerning new leadership models and the trends transforming the world have changed their thinking and their future career and life plans.
- d. One of our teams managed to utilize Google Hangout and have communication with WAY members and established dialogue on their projects.

Performance against Objectives

In assessing our performance against objectives, we can say that we missed several significant benchmarks:

- a. We did not create all of the successful teams we sought to create. Only 1 out of the 7 successfully created ongoing conversations between WAY and DCIS members. The objective was to create seven groups that would have online conversations and then would present at the conference their recommendations.
- b. The revised objective before the conference began was to have 150 members who would all be members of the individual global teams. All total from the two days of the conference, we had 67 participants.

c. We initially set out to obtain \$150,000 in funding, based on the comps provided to me from WAY. However, our funding efforts fell short due to the relative newness of our organization, CO-LEAD to the non-profit funding community. They were not familiar with our work, which presented an obstacle in developing funding relationships.

Performance against Schedule

In assessing our performance against schedule, we were able to achieve some timely goals.

- a. The date for the conference was set for October 6 months out, so we were able to keep that date.
- b. It would have worked in our favour to start the invitation to the conference sooner so that potential attendees could have started their VISA process much earlier to provide time to resolve any conflicts.

Performance against Budget

All of our major budget expenses were in-kind from the University of Colorado-Denver. While we were short in our fund raising efforts to accommodate a larger gathering, we were able to cover the expenses of the smaller gathering.

Lessons Learnt

In order to find out more of the areas of the conference that worked and what could be improved, we provided the DCIS attendees an evaluation form of the event. They provided us with these basic recommendations:

- a. Explain more about the nature of the conference.
- b. Provide more details about each subject matter to be covered by each team.
- c. Help resolve the VISA challenges early so that the member to member connection could be focused on the subject matter rather than on VISA applications.

Chet has performed informal surveys with WAY members who ran into VISA issues before the conference. Here is what was recommended to him:

- a. Start the VISA process earlier to help resolve conflicts.
- b. Provide a stamped letter for the VISA which would expedite the process.
- c. Get information out about the conference much earlier.

Recommendations

Here are the recommendations that we have arrived at for a future conference we'd like to bring to the US in 2017.

- 1. Come to an agreement with WAY to handle all registration and VISA arrangements with attendees from other countries.
- 2. Have a complete staff and infrastructure in place by the fourth quarter of 2016 to manage the conference and to maintain our communication with WAY.
- 3. Leverage our new 501 (c)3 status to start raising funds in 2016 for the conference in 2017.
- 4. Meet our budgetary goal by first quarter of 2017 in order to have the conference by fourth quarter 2017.
- 5. Attend several WAY conferences and events in 2016 to socialize and reintroduce the conference to members.
- 6. Create 60 Day Internships leading up to the conferences that would include DCIS and WAY members.

With these recommended changes to our strategy, we are certain that the second CO-LEAD/WAY event will be an even greater success in 2017.
